TALKS

Tuesday 12th March at 19.30. "Growing Perennials and Woody Plants for Cutting" by Rachel Siegfried.

Rachel Siegfried who runs Green & Gorgeous, a cut flower farm near Wallingford, makes a return! Since talking to us in April 2018 Green & Gorgeous has gone from strength to strength and based on her experience Rachel has recently written a book on the best perennials and woody plants for producing cut flowers. Her talk on this occasion will focus on these plants. Tuesday 9th April at 19.30. ""Dispelling 10 Myths About Peonies – One of the Most Sought After Flowering Garden Plants" by Alec White

Peonies are undoubtedly one of the most beautiful and flamboyant plants of late spring/early summer. There are however a lot of myths/old wives' tales about how difficult they can be to grow.

Alec White who runs Primrose Hall Peonies, one of the largest specialist growers in the country and home of national collections of several sub-types, will be visiting us to dispel some of these myths and hopefully persuade us to either "have a go" or perhaps add a new peony to our collections!

<u>1</u>3th February. "The Trowels and Tribulations of taking on a Historic Garden!" by Maggie Tran.

Cakes and country house gardens! Could that be the perfect way to spend a midwinter afternoon?

Fortified with tea, coffee and cakes & biscuits generously donated by several members to help society funds, members were treated to an account of how newlyqualified head gardener Maggie set about discovering the charms, renovating and updating 6 acres of garden at Bramdean House.

Taking a year, largely just to discover what horticultural treasures were hiding in the garden, had proved invaluable. Though serious pruning of some "specimen" plants had also been necessary to give other "treasures" a chance and even reveal some garden buildings! Fully rejuvenating some climbing roses had also taken up to 4 years.

The "signature" mirror herbaceous gardens had also proved both a challenge and delight. Originally precisely laid out some plants had migrated or disappeared over the years. Meticulous monitoring and measuring with close reference to original plans had been essential to restoring these beds to their former glory!

More fundamental changes had been decided upon for the large walled vegetable garden. Fewer staff together with current thinking indicated "no dig" was probably the way to go! So far so good!

Clearly an NGS garden worth visiting!

We have chosen to visit Exbury in May to see their vast collection of dazzling flowering Azalias and Rhododendrons as well as the late Spring and early summer collection of camassias, flowering cherries and flowering shrubs.

The gardens were created for the de Rothschilds family 100 years ago and stretches down to the banks of the tranquil River Beaulieu. There is a recommended train ride available at £6.50 option to book when you arrive to see the gardens.there are options to hop on and off aswell. The gardens have various impressive water features, delightful woodland valleys, Sundial Garden, stunning Azalea Bowl, newly created Centenary Garden, lots of robust footpaths and champion trees.

There is a restaurant, gift shop and picnic area near the entrance. A small cafe is further inside the gardens.

<u>Spring arrives</u>

Spring usually arrives by mid-March and the frequent sunny days provide the opportunity for an increasing range of gardening tasks. It's time to get busy preparing seed beds, sowing seed, cutting back winter shrubs and generally tidying up around the garden.

1. Prune bush and climbing roses

2. Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes

3. Plant summer-flowering bulbs

Bulbs make a fine display planted in containers or borders, especially daffodils, snowdrops and tulips in spring. They are one of the easiest and most rewarding garden plants to grow. 4. Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials

5. Top dress containers with fresh compost

6. Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)

7. **HARD** cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) grown for colourful winter stems

8. Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under control early

9. Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond heaters

10. Protect new spring shoots from slugs

- Cutback buddleias
- Begin hoeing
- Get your begonias going
- Deadhead bulbs
- Protect new shoots
- Mulch for an easy life
- Coppice shrubs
- Start off dahlia tubers
- Begin mowing lawns
- Get going with Gladioli
- Check over alpines
- Repot Phalaenopsis orchids
- Hold off hedge trimming till birds are fledged
- Pinch out sweet peas green
- Clean your green house
- \circ Tidy up the strawberry patch
- Sow peas outdoors
- Start indoor tomatoes
- Avoid sowing tender veg
- Direct Sow hardy veg
- Plant Onion sets
- \circ $\;$ Avoid Sowing Tender veg $\;$
- Prune Blueberry bushes
